To begin with, I trace the Feenberg's assumptions through the work of Herbert Marcuse, especially how Marcuse's thought in Eros and Civilization may differ with a Lacanian framework. I am also bringing philosophers to Hong Kong to provide insights on democratic technology. On the practical side, I examine the extent to which democratic technology is enacted in the following cases: the crowd-sourced Fairphone, Hong Kong sex workers' use of CCTV to protect themselves, and environmental activists' engagement with AI firms.
